Unsaturated Fatty Acid Salts Remove Biofilms on Dentures

Candidiasis-causing Candida sp. forms biofilms with various oral bacteria in the dentures of the elderly, making it harder to kill and remove the microorganism due to the extracellular polymeric substances. We found that biofilms on dentures can effectively be removed by immersion in an unsaturated fatty acid salt solution.

The FDA will continue to monitor aducanumab and is requiring biogen to conduct a post approval clinical trial to verify the drug's clinical benefit






Bispecific Antibody Active in NRG1-Positive Pancreatic Cancer






